#### **CHAIR'S MESSAGE 2021 - 2022**



ANZGITA'S MISSION is to improve community health in developing Indo-Pacific nations by enhancing the standard of gastroenterology practice and treatment of digestive diseases through the provision of training, equipment and support.

**ANZGITA has survived**, I might say even thrived in novel ways, in the COVID pandemic.

Well, yes, our in-country activities have been severely curtailed due to the virus but, as the situation improved, we accepted the invitation to run our annual Fiji program in June. Our doctor and nurse trainers renewed relationships, made new friendships and further cemented the successful ANZGITA model of training. Although program preparation and execution were hampered as we all emerged from pandemic conditions, the dedication of our trainers, **Fijian** colleagues and trainees ensured it was a success.

Last year I noted the further development of virtual training activities. The monthly webinars, now the **Pacific Gut Club**, continue as impactful and popular interactive discussions on a range of relevant topics. A weekly virtual training program for **Samoan** doctors wishing to learn endoscopy was also instituted to complement local practical training. A COVID lockdown caused a pause, but the program has started again with American Samoan involvement.

The pilot **vTERM project** – virtual Training in Endoscopy by Remote Mentoring – steered by a highly credentialed multinational project team, will begin later in 2022. This innovation is ushering in a more sustainable approach to training and enabling frequent contact with trainees in their home environments – all real-time from teams in Australia.

There is more on all these programs in this report. Importantly, they demonstrate ANZGITA is continuing to innovate in response to our partners' expressed needs, bringing together in-country and virtual training modes to produce a more engaged and sustainable portfolio.

Environmental sustainability initiatives have gained momentum across the gastroenterology world and we will increase support for our partners as they work on the Sustainable Development Goals of their countries.

In addition to training, we continued to assist our partners in securing high priority **equipment and materials**. Of note was the completion of the multi-faceted endoscope reprocessing system at the national hospital (HNGV) in **Timor-Leste**, which is highlighted in this report.

These programs and initiatives are only happening because of the efforts of my fellow directors, our program leaders and trainers, and our in-country partners. There is also a very small non-clinical team, mostly voluntary, that handles our marketing, communications and administration. I admire them all for their commitment and innovation in challenging times.

Of special note is my enormous gratitude to **Tony Clarke** who is retiring, having been the inaugural Programs Coordinator and Deputy Chair. Tony's contribution to the success of ANZGITA could easily be judged as the most significant to date. I am delighted that **Chris Hair** has agreed to be our new Deputy Chair.

Long-time member **Robyn Nagel** has taken on the Programs Coordinator role. In preparation, she was as a trainer on the Fiji program and will also attend the Timor-Leste program in August. An excellent start to a challenging task.

Assoc Prof **Bruce Waxman** OAM has been appointed as our first Surgical Coordinator. Gastroenterology is a speciality practised by physicians and surgeons. Demonstrating the synergy between the disciplines and the value of collaboration is something to be accentuated in our training.

To all our donors and grant providers – thank you! Medical industry suppliers also continue to be very generous in-kind donors. It is appropriate to acknowledge **Graham Hines**, from CR Kennedy, who has been an indefatigable support for ANZGITA and deserves special recognition as he too steps into retirement.

I encourage you to read this report and be fortified by the generosity of spirit, innovation and determination of everyone delivering, utilising or supporting ANZGITA's work.





In Fiji we delivered a three-week in-country program at the WGO Training Centre with our partners at CWMH and FNU.









#### **Our Training & Mentoring Programs**

Until May of the reporting year we delivered all training and mentoring as **virtual internet activities**. In June we delivered our first in-country training program in association with our local Fijian partners since the start of COVID.

The gastroenterology webinar program evolved into the Pacific Gut Club for seven meetings in 2022. Its leaders, Chris Hair and Asst Prof Mai Ling Perman (FNU and President Internal Medicine Organisation of the Pacific) were joined by Prof David Russell of Royal Melbourne Hospital & University of Melbourne, who broadened the topics to include lectures on nutrition. Attendance Certificates for accruing hours under Continuing Professional Development governance systems in Pacific Island Countries are now provided on request.

Group communication apps such as WhatsApp and Viber continued to be utilised to support our colleagues on matters ranging from healthcare support on specific patients to simply staying connected during difficult periods.

Our communications partner, the **Pacific Basin Telehealth Resource Centre** (PBTRC) of the University of Hawai'i, led by Co-Director **Dr Christina Higa**, again provided zoom conferencing technology and administration support.

A four-week Fiji in-country program was planned and delivered in June at relatively short notice following a request from our Fiji colleagues, with the availability of PIP funding being subject to a 30 June deadline. The **Post Graduate Masters and Diploma program** at FNU was also brought forward.

A team of nine trainers each spending up to two weeks taught 16 doctor and 14 nurse trainees. This was a higher than normal number which reflected a backlog training requirement.

A higher proportion than usual were from Fiji due to several PICs in COVID lockdown. Unfortunately, the last week of the program was largely cancelled due to many of the trainees and two of our trainers catching COVID. However, there were still some online lectures delivered to the FNU students.

#### Our Training & Mentoring Programs (continued)

**Nurse Training** on the program was structured around the course being developed using a mixture of pre-recorded presentation / video and real-time virtual training. For each aspect, general theory and application will be delivered in the pre-recorded material while real-time sessions will cover the practicalities of implementation given the setup and resources specific to the centre receiving training.

Throughout 2021, under the **Responding in the Pacific Education (RIPE)**, we partnered with **Dr Meru Sheel** and **Dr Adam Jenny** to organise and deliver 15 sessions covering COVID issues. These were well received with up to 80 attendees per session.






# Total Programs now completed by Trainers

#### Innovative vTERM Project Piloted in 2022 in Palau

**vTERM** – **virtual Training in Endoscopy by Remote Mentoring** is an innovative project utilising the latest digital technologies. It enables virtual side-by-side mentoring of doctors as regularly as required, building on the skills acquired at annual/bi-annual in-country training programs.

In-procedure remote endoscopy mentoring is provided from a distant site via HD Zoom. Almost ubiquitous optical fibre services around the Pacific provide reliable real-time connections. The pilot is being conducted with **Dr Myra Adelbai** at **Belau National Hospital** in **Palau**.


The feasibility of remote mentoring based on access to images from the endoscope and endoscopist was demonstrated by **Prof Jerry Waye** (USA). It has been developed further by **Assoc Prof Chris Hair** in his virtual presentation "Establishing Teaching Endoscopy by Remote Mentoring (TERM) in Oceania" at the GASTRO 2021 Prague, 9-10 Dec, and implemented by a project team he assembled of ANZGITA and partners:

#### Timor-Leste National Hospital Endoscopy Reprocessing System

In 2022 the final item of a **sustainable Endoscope Reprocessing System** suitable for Timor-Leste conditions was commissioned at the endoscopy unit of the National Hospital – Hospital Nacional Guido Valadares (**HNGV**).

A service was established at the hospital in 2016 when **Dr Chris Kiely** was resident in Dili for two years. Since then, except for the COVID period, ANZGITA has conducted regular training programs at the hospital and, with donor and supplier help, contributed to the development of the endoscopy facilities.

**Endoscopy practice must** safe. be and risk minimisation of crossinfection between patients endoscopes essential. It must also be safe for nursing staff who relatively use toxic chemicals in reprocessing.

HNGV's system has been designed by the ANZGITA team to meet endoscope and accessory reprocessing requirements

in local operational and support conditions. We see it as a forerunner for installations in other partners' centres. The system, valued in excess of A\$100,000, is comprised of:

- Semi-automatic cleaning and disinfection system
- Drying and storage cabinet fed by a medical air quality air-compressor
- Benchtop steriliser
- Ultrasonic Cleaner

# What Sustainable Endoscopy Means for ANZGITA

Maintaining environmental integrity and driving sustainable economic prosperity and development in a region which is 'at the frontline of the adverse impacts of climate change' are objectives of the Pacific Islands Forum in its Blue Pacific 2050 strategy. We believe they also apply to other Indo-Pacific countries where we have partners. ANZGITA is committed to assisting our partners in their professional work as they support the achievement of those objectives. The issues we see that need addressing are:

- Healthcare activities significantly contribute to greenhouse gas emission and waste production, with gastrointestinal (GI) endoscopy being one of the largest contributors (likely third after Theatres and ICU).
- Reducing the impact of our training activities on the environment. How best to make use of air travel (it contributes around 4% towards global warming) to work with our partners, the way we conduct on-site training and other aspects.
- Long-term, self-managed sustainability of endoscopy services covering all resourcing aspects – financial, people (including training), equipment / materials, information – is a goal of all our partners. Long-term sustainability of ANZGITA is also part of this issue.

# **Supporting Sustainable Endoscopy Practice**

**ANZGITA** is already addressing Sustainable Endoscopy with our partners and in our own work, seeking to harness existing industry initiatives and build on sustainable endoscopy practice.

- We designed and installed two reprocessing systems that now enable in-country partners to reduce the use of toxic chemicals and better aid the safe reuse of accessories.
- These reprocessing systems are designed with components that can be affordably maintained and emphasise the use of local knowhow.
- We have provided a formula for local production of an H.pylori test
   no packaging, reusable containers, no transport reduced waste.

- For the last five years, we invested in developing virtual training. We are now piloting multiple models of virtual and incountry training which enhance training without increasing our carbon footprint in air travel.
- We sourced reusable accessory devices, not available in Australia, for in-country partners.

- We are building digital systems which enable us to manage our programs with fewer resources.
- We are investigating new incountry training methods to reduce waste, e.g., a greater use of simulators.
- We continue to draw on the knowledge members gained through their involvement in national and international forums and in their workplaces to support sustainable endoscopy practice.
- We have provided advice on best practice standards for facilities, equipment, management structures and processes.

#### Financial Statement 2021 – 2022

Summary – ANZGITA recorded funds inflow of \$88,381 and outflow of \$96,876 for a net cash decrease of (\$8,496). The full report by the ANZGITA Treasurer is on our website.

**Total expenditure** on administration, programs, covering capital and service items, was \$96,876 with services and equipment delivered on one in-country program in Fiji and by virtual programs to it and other countries.

ANZGITA does not own or hold any fixed assets and cash at bank of \$96,396.29 represents the only current asset owned by ANZGITA (see balance sheet). With 7 years of operating results available from our accounting system, the Board can review the pattern of funds inflow and program expenditures for planning purposes.

**ANZGITA's Board** has acted to ensure that comprehensive insurance coverage is in place to protect the activities of both directors and program clinicians from all identified risks. Services provided by directors are on a pro bono basis. All trainers, including directors, who are engaged directly in delivering programs provide their services pro bono and are reimbursed their expenses only.

**ANZGITA** does not undertake a formal external audit as the cost would outweigh the benefits. The bank balance is reported regularly at Board and management meetings and details are noted in minutes.

This information is certified annually by an independent member of CPA and a report issued to the Board.
